## Ethics Committee Slates and Nomination Statement (for member terms from January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026)

The Ethics Committee approved the following slate characteristics for three (3) slates to be nominated and elected in 2023 (for member terms from January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026). In addition, the Committee approved the following nomination statement.

Slate 1.- Early Career Psychologist (ECP) in an emerging area (e.g., technology, telepsychology, Al, integrated care, media/social media, open science, and other emerging areas).

Slate 2 - Psychologist with expertise or primary focus on equity, diversity, and inclusion including teaching, research, or consulting to organizations or institutions.

Slate 3 – Senior scientist or applied psychologist with expertise and experience in areas such as research ethics, publication ethics, institutional review boards, ethical open science, etc.

## **Nomination Statement**

The Ethics Committee evaluates candidate experience including ethics education and scholarship, evaluation of ethical conduct of psychologists (e.g., service on human subjects institutional review board, state association ethics committee, state board of psychology), or other relevant ethics experience. The Committee engages in adjudication related to the possible unethical behavior of members, associates and affiliates and makes recommendations regarding membership or affiliation of those applying to APA who report possible prior unethical conduct. The Ethics Committee continues to expand its mission to be a resource for ethics consultation and education for APA; for members at all career stages and in all areas of psychology, the public and the discipline. The Ethics Committee reviews draft guidelines and association policies, partners with governance groups, and works to institute initiatives and policies that support the ethical practice of all psychologists and the APA as an organization. The Ethics Committee encourages the nominations, including self-nominations, of members whose identities and expertise represent the breadth of perspective of the field and practice of psychology and diversity of APA's membership (e.g., ethnicity, race, culture, gender, gender identity, age, career stage, persons with different ability status, sexual orientation, and geographic location, with a preference for states that have predominately rural and tight-knit communities, and where psychologists are underrepresented). Nominations should include a current CV for the nominee.

Ethics Committee members must be willing to commit approximately 5-10 hours per month (e.g., document review, virtual meetings) to ongoing Committee work and approximately 10-20 hours in preparation for extended possible in-person and/or virtual meetings. The Committee meets virtually on a monthly basis for 90 minutes, which may be extended to a full-day virtual meeting once or twice per year. In addition, the Committee meets once in the Spring for a two-day in-person meeting. The inperson meeting is held at APA headquarters in Washington, DC, and members' travel, lodging, and meal expenses are covered by the Committee's budget. The Committee also gives presentations at the APA Convention each year. Attendance at Convention (at your own expense) and active involvement is encouraged.
